BOOK REVIEW

Defending New Zealand. Ramparts on the Sea 1840-1950, by Peter Cooke, Defence of New Zealand Study Group.

Pictorial Issue. This issue includes hundreds of photographs and text covering the period. It includes items on Fixed Defences and Forces in the 19th Century, WWI, WWII Fixed Defences, Air Defence, The Home Guard, Anti Invasion Measures to mention just a few. The majority of this issue includes many photographs of the large number of Coastal Defence Guns and Gun Positions that were sited around the New Zealand Coast Line. Did you know that during WWII the Guns installed at Westport and Greymouth were MkVIII US Navy 51 cal 5 inch guns. They were the secondary armament on Battleships of the type sunk at Pearl Harbour. This gave rise to the rumour that the guns had been salvaged from the seafloor there (which was not the case). This small passage from the issue includes photographs of the guns. A BLAST FROM THE PAST

The following has been copied from The GUNNER (The Official Organ of the Royal Artillery Assn) Vol. XVIII. No. 8. November, 1936. Price 4d (Thanks to Teach Macown who supplied the copy.)

On the Sunday the 11th of October 1936 in the presence of a great congregation, the Senior Chaplin of the Forces, Woolwich, dedicated the Banners of the London and Southall branches of the Assn. This took place in St. George's Garrison Church, the shrine of the Regiment.

The Senior Chaplin addressed the congregation on Banners; their origin, lost in the mists of antiquity; their object as rallying points; their presence in battle in the earliest records of the Chinese, centuries before Christ; the allusions to them in the Bible story of the Israelites' desert march to Palestine; the veneration displayed for them by soldiers of all ages; the Roman standard bearers rallying the legions at critical moments by hurling their standards into the ranks of the enemy; the VC's which had been won in saving Regimental Colours.

The Chaplin continued 'but you of the Royal Regiment of Artillery with your guns and the Battle Honour "Ubique" have no need of colours for war-like purposes. These standards which we have dedicated today are to be the rallying points of members of the R.A. Assn' in their brotherhood for the promotion of good fellowship and the relief of distressed comrades." The Chaplin concluded with an appropriate quotation from the Book of Solomon: "His Banner over me was love."

Note the similarity to the objectives of the NZPFOCA in the last paragraph. More from this copy of The GUNNER will be published in future News Letters.

- -If you drink, don't park. Accidents cause people.



THE GUN





Fig. 146A: OF 12-pr 12-cwt on Carriage Garrison modified for high angle fire during World War 1.

Eventually demands for a more powerful gun to replace the 6-prs resulted in the 12-pr 12-cwt which entered service in both Navy and coast defence in 1894. See Fig. 146.



Calibre: 3 inch (76.2 mm)

M.V. 2258 fs (688 ms)

Ammunition: Separate loading

Rifling: Polygroove EOC section

Detachment: ¢

Range: 8,000 yds (7315 m).

Elevation: 20°

Firing: Electric and percussion.

Grooves: 16 - increasing twist.

Recoil: 12 inches (30.5 cm).

Note that the gun has no traversing gear; it is 'shoulder-controlled,' i.e. the layer traversed by means of the 'shoulder-piece' to the left of the breech.

About the time the 12-pr 12-cwt was introduced a 12-pr 8-cwt was proposed for the Navy to support landing parties. However this gun was mounted on a carriage typical of current field carriages. The recoil system fitted was inefficient, and drag shoes had to be used. as well. It was not popular with the Navy who complained it was 'too powerful' for their purposes.

The introduction of 'torpedo-boat destroyers' (later simply known as 'destroyers'), led in 1903 to the production of a number of 12-prs 18=cwt. These were similar to the 12-cwt guns but 10 calibres longer See Fig. 146B.

The 12-pr on a high-angle mounting was adapted to the anti-aircraft role during World War 1, after which it reverted to the coast role. Some were 'resurrected' during World War 2 for use on Defensively Armed Merchant Ships (DEMS) See Fig. 146A.

The 12-pr 12-cwt remained in service until the abolition of coast artillery in 1956 (1959 in New Zealand).

NB: 'cwt' is 'hundredweight' abbreviated. It is 112 lbs (51 kg).


