NZDF Artillery team trains Ukrainians alongside UK

A New Zealand Defence Force Artillery team trained Ukrainian soldiers in using L119 105mm light field guns and dial sights for the weapons system earlier this year.

The 30-personnel strong training team deployed for two months, and instructed members of the Armed Forces of Ukraine in the United Kingdom. NZDF personnel did not enter Ukraine.

The NZDF also provided approximately 40 gun sights to Ukraine, along with 360 rounds of ammunition for training purposes. 16 th Field Regiment Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel Dean Gerling said the training team spent the days before deploying the equipment as well as the delivery of the instruction to people.

"The delivery of this instruction was complicated by having to use translators and interpreters to ensure the technical side of artillery and gunnery can be portrayed in a manner the Ukrainian forces can understand."

He said the ability for 16 Field Regiment and the wider Royal New Zealand Artillery team to deploy demonstrated the importance of their continued training over Operation Protect, but also since then.

""All artillery equipment needs to be pointing in the right direction, and that orientation can ensure all of those light guns are pointing in parallel to each other, so we know the rounds are going to land on target," he said.

"The dial site is a piece of equipment that is used to ensure the light gun is pointing individually in the right direction to achieve the desired effect at the target end," he said.

The Artillery Training Team joins more than 60 other NZDF personnel deployed to the UK and Europe where they are working with international partners in support of Ukraine's self-defence.



"The School of Artillery has continued to conduct individual coursing in gunnery during Op Protect so that we have been able to maintain an individual based level of capability throughout the period of Covid-19.

"In addition, 16 Field Regiment has continued to conduct unit based training in those windows when people haven't been on Op Protect to maintain a basic level of capability."

The NZDF training team would be part of a wider UK team instructing in use of the light gun, and was primarily focused on training orientation of the light guns and use of dial sites.

The framework has been developed for the wide range of individuals and organisations that contribute to the mental health and wellbeing of veterans and their families. This includes civilian organisations such as government departments, health service funders, workforce and research bodies, and health provider groups such as doctors, nurses and allied professions. It will also be useful for the New Zealand Defence Force and service and veterans' organisations.

NATO AWARD FOR ARMY OFFICER'S AFGHANISTAN WORK

Tying up all the loose ends of New Zealand's Afghanistan commitment as Covid-19 raged in the country was just one of the challenges Colonel Ben Bagley faced on his most recent deployment.

His demonstration of exemplary leadership and devotion to duty during the deployment has earned him a prestigious NATO Meritorious Service Medal which was presented to him by Defence Minister Peeni Henare recently.

COL Bagley deployed to Afghanistan in mid-2020. His task was to close down the Op Rua II training mission in the midst of the close down and withdrawal of forces for NATO's Operation Resolute Support. By then New Zealand had reduced its presence in Afghanistan to only six personnel, relying heavily on the support provided by the Australian Defence Force.

Deployed as New Zealand's Senior National Officer and Director of Future Operations, he was given the task to officially hand back Kandahar Air Base to the Afghanistan authorities not long after arriving in theatre. "We couldn't meet Afghan officials in person, so the whole job was completed by VTC," he said.

As the Kandahar handover was being organised, concurrent planning for the handover of air bases at Herat, Mazar-i-Sharif and Bagram was also added to the task. As the mission drew down his duties also included reducing the troop force flow into theatre to prepare for withdrawal, whilst maintaining the viability and security of key bases.

As Director of Future Operations he led the Resolute Support Force Management Board and streamlined a complex process which enabled multi-nation capability to be maintained. His job involved keeping airfield operations going at a vital air node which enabled civil and military flights to continue to support the Afghanistan National Defence and Security Forces in Kandahar Province and southern Afghanistan.

He engaged with every branch of the Afghanistan National Defence and Security Forces, and lead a disparate group of stakeholders to develop solutions that enabled airfields to continue to function once handed over by the mission.

COL Bagley's citation said his efforts resulted in the continuation of airfield security and services, which preserved capability. "Through his distinguished work ethic COL Bagley has influenced, reassured and assisted members from all services of the Afghanistan National Defence and Security Forces," it said.

The spread of Covid-19 throughout Kabul meant all welfare facilities such as base gymnasiums and support facilities could not be used. "For PT it was just a matter of putting on thermals and dusting the snow off the equipment that had been moved outside to avoid the further spread of the virus." The Kiwi team based in Kabul did really well to overcome all of these seemingly insignificant challenges to ensure they maintained their cohesiveness and morale, he said. Base dining facilities were also closed although takeaway food was available. When the chefs succumbed to Covid 19, ration packs were issued. COL Bagley said he felt humbled to receive the award and was proud of the work he and his team achieved in what was a challenging and fluid environment.

The Great L5 Roundup

Thanks to your efforts, we have traced 21 of the 24 L5 guns known to have served with the RNZA, with one more to be verified. Three are missing without trace. Quite apart from the list below, we also have a database of photos of most of these guns.

We have also had a bit of success with detailing some of the gun's histories, including the guns that served in South Vietnam.

According to Steve Newman's book, Vietnam Gunners, a total of eight L5s were sent to South Vietnam. There were 5 in the first deployment, believed to be 01301 – 01305.

On 14 March 1966, approval was given to increase the Battery's establishment by one more to bring it up to a full six gun battery. On 1 July, two more arrived in country to replace two badly worn ones, sent back to New Zealand for base repairs.

In early 1967, the L5s, being unable to withstand the stress that the periods of sustained fire that the Battery's change of role required, were replaced with M2A2s, the US 105mm gun. The L5s were sent back to New Zealand for refurbishing, after which they were dispersed to sub-units around the North Island. We believe we can identify which of the guns are ex-Vietnam guns. This is reflected in the list below.

Due to the mix and match nature of the guns, which occurred when the Guns were decommissioned and made up for allocation to RSAs and memorials, we have determined that the number on the top of the breech ring, is the gun number and the Mla number on the rear of the breech ring is the Breech number. This may or not be reflected on the Data Plate.


Korean War Armistice Signing on 27 July Wellington

22(D) Battery Reunion

On the evening of 22 July 1867 a meeting was held in the Princess Hotel, Molesworth Street, Wellington. At this meeting an organisation known as the Wellington Artillery Volunteers was formed.

It is from the Volunteers that 22 (D) Bty, 16 Field Regiment, Royal Regiment of New Zealand Artillery can trace its history. Prior to the First World War the Battery was known as D Battery. To preserve the historical link the letter D was added to 22 Bty's title in January 1971.

The 155th Anniversary reunion of 22(D) Battery will be held at the Porirua RSA over the weekend 22-24 July 2022.

D Battery was equipped with a variety of guns over the years, for example: 24pdrs, one of which was hauled by the volunteers up Mt Victoria and still remains there; Armstrong 9 pdrs, which they held their first live shell practice at targets moored in the Wellington Harbour in January 1868; and the Nordenfelt guns and 15 pounders which the Battery took to Samoa in 1914, this being the only occasion when the Battery has served overseas as a unit.

In the early days of D Battery intending members had to be proposed, seconded and elected to membership by two thirds majority. If he was then allowed to join, the new member had to pay £3 (a lot of money in those days) to a unit fund to cover the cost of uniforms.

The highly successful RNZAA celebration of Gunners Day 2022 in Auckland gathered together three ideas. First, to forge closer links with the Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief Her Excellency Dame Cindy Kiro, as the Patron of the RNZAA. Second, after the cancellation of the 2021 Reunion to arrange a memorable Gunners Day event in Auckland (even if held late to accommodate our Patron's travel). Third, to have a proper venue for a presentation to the RNZAA's former President.

The Committee had been looking for a memorable venue. We invited Dame Cindy to host the event, pointing to (a) the long history between the Sovereign and the Artillery, (b) the constitutional nicety that soldiers swear the attestation oath to the Sovereign and not the Government of the day, and (c) the commitment and cheerfulness with which Gunners had done their Quarantine duty in hotels...

To some surprise, an invite arrived from Dame Cindy to be her guests at Government House. This is a substantial old home with a large garden on a magnificent site in the opulent neighbourhood of Epsom.

We discovered matters of protocol in dealing with Government House. A person was assigned to work with us. A delightful lady, she enjoyed the quirks and customs of the RNZAA. We submitted for review any material we were to send out about the dinner. Care was paid to the prohibition of raffle tickets during the event.



The process began to bring in people from the various parts of the Artillery. The net was spread wide, to reach the full range of Gunners, throughout New Zealand. Enough people replied in the first couple of hours to fill about a third of the seats. The first Old Gunner to respond lives in Melbourne. Unfortunately, a change of plans intervened.

We reached out in particular to some of the artists: Mike Subritzky (poet), Matt Gauldie (sculptor), and John Knowles (musician). Now a separate, civilian group, the whole RNZA band was keen to participate. Numbers had to be restricted to the space available.

The Regiment sent up two model guns from Palmerston North, while our President Major Shay Bassett lent a third. John Vague brought from his yacht the Gunner flag to decorate the flagpole, which was illuminated in the dark by a light brought along by Major Peter Mortimer RNZIR. Bernie McCort brought from Rotorua the present that she had arranged. Chris Pearce drove up from the Coromandel with a dozen bottles of Artillery Port.

As usual, some late replies arrived, which were filled in for some withdrawals. Gunner's Luck left us with 70 people, being the maximum number for seven tables in the Pavilion. Dame Cindy occupied the top official table, while her Official Secretary occupied the other. Other guests were Mrs Mary McLeod and Mrs Jacqueline Bassett, who accompanied their respective husbands; from the Infantry, Major Mortimer, our guest to propose the Toast, and our very own Paul Weldrand of Op Ubique, in origin a Yorkshire infantryman; plus a Life Member who was attached to the Guns in Vietnam.



The balance numbered 63 Gunners. Lack of space precluded an open invitation to spouses. The Gunners ranged from the Colonel Commandant Brig. Paul Southwell, across to short-term Gunners from the 1960s who had served in Vietnam. The average length of service was about 20 years, and the average age was about 68. Deployments ranged from Malaya to the Middle East, usually as solders in a composite unit than as members of a Battery.

Major Bassett as PMC welcomed guests alongside the Official Secretary in the patio. He sent them off to the first phase of the night. This was a reception in a large lounge, which is normally reserved for distinguished foreign dignitaries.

The surprise on arrival was the presence of 9 or so band members inside the lounge, playing *merrie tunes*. Soon the room was filled with happy conversation, as Old Gunners met up, serving Gunners met Old Gunners, and serving Gunners caught up with each other.

Apart from the general merriment, Dame Cindy held a small reception for the Official Party in a side room. This Party consisted of key people in the RNZA and the RNZAA: the Regimental Colonel, Col. Ben Bagley; our President Major Bassett; WO1 Evan Kareko as the Regimental Warrant Officer; WO2 Shane Lawrence; and Bernie McCort, the indefatigable doer of good deeds for veterans.

Announced by an ADC, Dame Cindy then joined the reception. She moved freely through the room, paying particular attention to the Vietnam veterans. She has an acute capacity to initiate a conversation with genuine interest and warmth.





Too soon the time came for dinner itself, on the other side of the house. The seven tables were all named. Dame Cindy was at Headquarters, along with dignitaries. The other official table with the CO Lt. Col. Dean Gerling was Regiment. A cluster of bemedalled Colonels and Majors going back to the Vietnam War occupied Command Post, while a mix of serving and veteran Warrant Officers assembled on Gun Line. The table set aside for a number of Vietnam veterans was called 161 Battery. A mixture of Subalterns and Sergeants found themselves assigned to the Remote OP table. A group of Gun Number types assembled around the table Tiffies, along with Bernie McCort. The Government House staff had puzzled at the term, and were interested to hear about the indispensable role of RNZEME artificers on the gun line.

The formalities consisted of the entry of the Governor-General Dame Cindy, and her short, informative, and occasionally humorous address of welcome. She recalled that some of her ancestors fought at Ruapekaka Pa in 1846, against British cannon.

Brig. Southwell made a laudatory speech about the achievements of the former President, Lt. Col. (Rtd.) Tony McLeod, across 10 years in revivifying the Association. He then invited Dame Cindy to come forward to the dais, along with Tony McLeod and Mary McLeod. She presented to Tony McLeod the RNZAA's gift of a mere, made of greenstone/pounamu. It sits on a wooden base, which is inscribed "First in word and deed". The phrase comes from the praises by the Greek historian Thucydides in the fifth century BC, of the great General Pericles of Athens. She presented to Mary McLeod a bouquet of flowers – red and blue, the colours of the RNZA.

With Mary McLeod standing at his side, Tony gave a short account of his work. He started by acknowledging the two ADC's in the room, who are successors to his service as ADC to Sir Keith Holyoake when he was Governor-General. He recorded as the two great achievements the expansion of membership by the removal of any type of subscription, and the active involvement of the RNZAA as a veterans organisation advocating for veterans before Parliament on the Veterans Support Act.





The ADC then invited Vic Timu to say Grace. An Old Gunner from Vietnam who subsequently devoted his services elsewhere in the Army, he recited a karakia in Maori. Then the traditional Gunners Grace: "For what we are about to receive, thank God". Whereupon the first of the three courses for dinner arrived.

After the meal, the port decanters passed in the air above the tables from glass to glass. Major. Bassett as PMC called for the Toasts.

Dame Cindy proposed the Loyal Toast.



Major Mortimer toasted the Regiment with wit and learning, to the receptive ears of the Gunners. Col. Bagley replied to the Toast, drawing on his family's experience. He cited to the example of Gunner White MM in North Africa. He earned his medal for keeping his gun firing as the rest of the gun crew were wounded and removed from the gun pit. The lesson is that the Guns will keep firing, as long as one Gunner is able to load, lay and fire..

Bernie McCort proposed the Toast to Spouses, which was heard in awed silence and brought tears to some in the room. Having seen generations of Gunners enter, serve, and depart, WO1 Kareko was the best person to propose the Toast to Absent Friends.





To finish off, the short poem Kiwi Peacekeepers by Mike Subritzky was recited. It reflects his experiences in Rhodesia at the time of the transition to Majority Rule. At the end Mike stood to acknowledge the room's applause. And then the time had come for tea and coffee, and departure.



All good things must come to an end. Still, jovial little groups of Colonels and Warrant Officers lingered to talk on the patio, long after the cleaners had arrived for the room.

By the end, John Vague had retrieved his flag from the flagpole and Major Mortimer disconnected and highlights of his life.

It is a most fitting occasion for us to recognize and thank our retiring President, Lt Col Tony McLeod and his wife Mary for the their many years of service to the association.

Tony also had a hand in working with our past Col Commandant Barry Dryer in establishing the RNZA Historical Trust to ensure the preservation of artillery items of historical value.

Tony McLeod and Mary McLeod

Tony was born on 8 June 1951 at Devonport, Auckland. He attended Westlake Boys High School 1964-68.

He joined the NZ Army in Jan 1969 and attended the Royal Military College of Australia, Duntroon (1969 -1972). He graduated in Dec 1972 with a BA (Military Studies) as a Lieutenant into the Royal New Zealand Artillery. After serving as a platoon commander with the first two Territorial Force Intakes, he was posted to 4(G) Medium Battery as the cadre officer ('73-'74) and then 161 Battery as the GPO ('75).

He was then posted to the School of Artillery as an IG ('76-'77), followed by 15 months as ADC to the Governor General, Sir Keith Holyoake. In 1979 he spent a year as an UNMO in UNTSO (Sinai, Golan Heights) before heading on a 6 months OE in Europe.







On return to NZ he spent 9 months as FOO 161 Battery, and then 12 months attending the Long Gunnery Course (8101) in Gagetown, Canada, after which he was posted back to Waiouru as Chief Instructor School of Artillery for 3 1/2 years ('82-'85). He then attended the Australian Army Command and Staff College ('86), and spent 6 months as SO2 Ops at 3 Task Force (ChCh) before being promoted to Lt Colonel and posted to Director of Artillery, AGS, Wellington (Jun'87-Dec'88).

He retired from the NZ Army on completion of 20 years service in Jan 1989
