We deeply regret the passing of the following Old Comrades who gave distinguished Service to their Country and the Regiment, in peace and in War in a great many places:

1810 A.D.(Doug) Warden: at Wellington on 21 Oct '82.:
Doug enlisted in RNZA in Jul 1938, where he Served at Fort Dorset.
Posted to the Middle East in Apr 1941, he joined the 7 A.Tk Regt, where he served until the end of the Campaigns in North Africa in May 1943.
Thence to Italy where he was severely wounded at Cassino in Apr 1944, being evacuated to NZ in Aug 1944.

Percented to PNZA Fort Dorset in Jul 1945, he was ultimately discharged.

Reposted to RNZA Fort Dorset in Jul 1945, he was ultimately discharged Medically Unfit in Oct 1945.

32615 D.W.(Bill) McAlpine, Assoc. Member, RNZSigs., at Auckland on 24 Dec '82.

Bill enlisted in NZEF in Oct 1940, being posted to Fiji, returning to NZ in Jun 1941, he was posted to the Middle East in Jul 1941. He was wounded in the Desert in Jun 1942 and again in Jul 1942. He Served throughout all the Desert Campaigns and later in Italy with NZ Divisional Sigs, and for a time in both 4 and 5 Fd Regts. Returning to NZ from Northern Italy with a Furlought Draft in Apr 1945, he was discharged from 2NZEF in Jul 1945.

Enlisting in Regular Force RNZSigs in Apr 1948, he Served in numerous Area Appointments in CMD, being closely associated with CMT training. Commissioned in Jul 1957, he later moved North to NMD, again in Areas, Papakura Camp, and Staff Appointments. He finally retired in Apr 1968.

30064. E.H.L.(Harden) Maxwell, OBE.MC.: suddenly at his home, Karori, Wellington, on 5 Jan 1983.

Hardy graduated from Duntroon in Dec 1939. Following several Appointments in NZ, he spent 9 mths of 1942 in Fiji.

He then embarked for the Middle East in Dec 1942. here the record is very sketchy, bur we can assume, because of the shortage of Gumner Officers at the time, that he saw the "end in Africa" in Tunisia in

May 1943.

History of NZ Div. Arty. on p.627 records that as BC.48 Bty in aggressive OP positions he was very actively engaged in the protracted and bitter fighting before Florence, where he won the Military Cross.

Following the end of the War in Italy, where he was Brigade Major et

Arty HQ, he was concerned with the disbandment of the Regiments, and the formation of "J" Force. He returned home in Jul 1946.

Nov. 1947 saw him posted to UK on a Long Gunnery Staff Course at School of Artillery, Larkhill, until Jun 1949.

He was then engaged in various Regimental and Staff Appointments at home until Apr 1955, when he again went overseas to "K" Force until Jul 1956, again involved in a disbandment exercise.

At home, again assuming Staff Duties, one of which was as ADC to the Governer General for one year,

Nov. 1958 again saw him posted overseas as Assistant Liaison Officer in London for three years, returning home in 1962.

His final posting was to Army HQ. in the Appointment of Military Secretary which he held until retirement in Apr 1966.

Unfortuneately his record does not show when he was awarded the OBE., but his story does show a very busy twenty-seven years in very many

places.

30068. J.A. (John) Pountney. MBE., at his home, Waikanae, Wellington, on 8 Jan 1983.

Jack graduated from Duntroon in Dec 1939. After several Regimental Appointments in NZ, he embarked for the Middle East in Sep 1941. During the confused and bitter fighting in the dreadful summer of 1942. about the time of Rommel's attempted breakthrough on the South (Qattara Depression) flank, as a 6 Fd Regt OP Officer he was badly wounded. necessitating his return home. (See Gunner Book p. 346.).

For the remainder of the War he was engaged in various Staff Appointments

at Army HQ.

In feb 1946 he was posted to Japan, returning in Feb 1947.

In Dec 1948 he was posted to UK for a Long Gunnery Staff Course (AA), at Manorbier, South Wales. Following the Course he did short Tours of Duty with HQ. AA Comd. (UK), and in Germany, returning home in Jan 1951. Then fo llowed various Regimental and Staff Appointments until Mar 1954. Posted to Korea as CO. 16 Fd Regt, Apr - Nov 154, Commander "K" Force Nov '54 to May '55, returning home in Jun 1955.

In Oct. 1956 he was posted as "Deputy Head of NZ Joint Staff Mission.

Washington. USA, for a period of three years".

Returning home in May '60, his next Appointment was to AHQ as DRNZA -1960-61. During this period, two TOD's in Australia.

Then followed various Staff Appointments, until his retirement in Jul. 1965.

Again a busy and full career spanning twety-six years.

34246. R.W. (Rex) Lovett, at Kaitaia on 31 Jan 1983: Rex sailed for the Middle East with 4 Fd Regt in the First Echelon, 2 NZEF in Jan 1940.

Two interesting entries, "Reported safe in Egypt" 18.5.41, then "Safe" 12.12.41, indicate that he may have been "on the loose" in Greece for some time.

Back with the Regt. he was appointed BSM of 25 Bty in Sep. 142. Following the remaining Desert Campaigns until "the end in Africa", he returned home with the first Furlough Draft in Jul. 1943, taking his discharge from 2.NZEF in Nov 43.

Rex enlisted in RNZA (RF)., in Dec 1949. His career then followed many Appointments in Coast, Field, and Loc Bty, mainly in NMD, also closely associated with CMT training; eventually taking his discharge as a WO2, in Feb 1956.
