As the oldest veteran of Korea and Vietnam living locally, Tony Tustin was invited by the organising committee of the combined Korea, Malaya, Borneo and Vietnam Veterans to present a Roll of Honour to the Mayor of Blenheim at a function held there on 8 Nov 92.

Blackie Burns has been assisting his daughter Janine, a long-time student of Chinese culture and language at Sydney University, by researching Chinese/Mongol tactics and strategy of the 12/13th century in order to put a literal translation of a contemporary work on the subject into modern military language.

In the course of his research he has concluded there can be no doubt that the preparation and use of gunpowder was well-understood in China long before its introduction into Europe, a fact long disputed by British and other European military historians.

An appropriate amendment to the article 'The Gun' is therefore printed below.

AMENDMENT TO NEWSLETTER 75; Page 5, Chapter 1, 'Gunpowder': Delete paragraphs 4 and 5 and substitute:

Among the many claiming to have discovered it are the Chinese, Hindus, Greeks, Arabs, Germans and English. Works of British and European origin up to 1970, upon which this paper is based, invariably dismiss claims by the first four peoples as lacking authenticity or supportive evidence, or even as errors in translation. Indeed, Europeans viewed the suggestion that gunpowder may have been discovered by an Eastern people as heresy.

However, recent research of early Chinese works leaves no doubt that the preparation and use of gunpowder was well-understood in China by the 13th century, long before its introduction to the west.

In those days Arab traders operating from Southern China brought Chinese ideas and technology to Europe. We know also that the earliest known reference to the refining of saltpetre appears in an Arabian text (in which it is called 'Chinese snow'), dated 1240. These facts reinforce the belief stated below that Bacon obtained his recipe for gunpowder from the Arabs - who first got it from the Chinese.

THE GUN

This was a typical example of mediaeval thinking. Because the clergy generally enjoyed a higher standard of living than other folk, therefore their urine was thought to be of higher quality. Eventually pure water was found to be the best moistener.

Corning thus formed a much more intimate mixture with the following advantages:

- !. Vibration had little effect on it; the ingredients no longer separated out during transport.
- 2. The grains were less susceptible to the effects of moisture.

- The gaps between the grains enabled flame to pass more freely, making the rate of burning more consistent.
- 4. Variations in loading conditions did not affect the rate of burning to the same extent.
 - 5. Corned powder was found to be at least 30% more powerful than serpentine.

Apparently not at first realising its added strength 15th century Gunners loaded charges of corned powder of the same weight as used with serpentine, so bursting a number of the old bombards. For this reason serpentine continued to be used in these guns until heavier and stronger types superseded them.

Polishing the powder grains by 'tumbling' them in a wooden barrel improved their moisture-resisting properties, while the addition of a small amount of graphite made the process even more effective.


Corned powder came into use in England in 1520.

Minor improvements to powder continued to be made chiefly by increasing the purity of its constituents and by experimenting with their proportions. In 1781 Richard Watson DD FRS, Bishop of Llandaff, who was also a professor of chemistry, ordained that for general purposes the proportions be saltpetre 75%, charcoal 15%, sulphur 10% — and for British gunpowder they have remained the same ever since. Later, in 1786 when asked by the Government for advice on improving the strength of powder he recommended the charcoal be made by 'distilling' the wood in closed vessels, and his recommendation was adopted.

CHAPTER 2:

THE FIRST GUN:

The genius who realised gunpowder could be used as a propellant and so invented the gun remains unknown. All we do know is that the first illustration of a piece of ordnance occurs in a treatise by one Walter de Millemete entitled 'De Officiis Regum' (On the Duties of Kings). Dated 1326, it is preserved in the library of Christ Church, Oxford. See Fig. 1.



The gun pictured was called a 'vaso' (plural 'vasi'), from the Italian for a vase which it closely resembled. The Gunner is pictured in the act of firing the piece by inserting a red-hot iron into the vent. The projectile leaving the muzzle was a species of arrow known as a 'dart,' 'carreau,' or 'quarrel.' The gun has no carriage; it simply lie on a trestle table.

England lagged behind the rest of Europe in gun-making during the 14th century. Judging from the name 'vaso' Walter's gun was probably made in Italy which led Europe in metal-working at that time. Also, the earliest known reliable reference to guns occurs in a decree of 11 Feb 1326 by th Council of Florence ordering the casting of a quantity of brass pieces and iron shot. Guns were probably in use before 1326 but claims to that effect as yet lack supporting evidence.

Unfortunately the text of Walter's work makes no reference to the illustration. As he was Chaplain to King Edward I, possibly he inserted it out of deference to the King who is said to have been a keen artilleryman.

We know that the earliest guns were cast from non-ferrous alloys, and the colour (gilt) of the piece in the original of Fig. 1 indicates it was made of a metal resembling brass, possibly bell metal. Extensive building of churches in Europe during the Middle Ages led to a steady demand for bells — and for bell—founders to switch to gun—founding would not have proved a difficult exercise.

During the 14th and 15th centuries England bought most if not all her cast brass or bronze guns from makers in Europe. When Henry VIII ascended the throne in 1509 the country had only one expert gun founder, a state of affairs he soon rectified by importing German, Italian and French gun founders not only to cast his ordnance but also to teach Englishmen how to do it.

Royal Regiment of New Zealand Artillery

New Zealand Gunner Trust Gunner Memorial - Waiouru Museum

Readers may recall an article which appeared in the February 1992 issue of Review seeking information on the Second New Zealand Artillery Unit Historic Fund Trust which was resting moribund in the Wellington Branch of the Bank of New Zealand. The Fund had been opened in 1949 to sponsor the writing of individual histories of the Divisional Artillery but had not been operated for many years and all the Trustees had died. Unfortunately the purpose for which the Trust Fund was established, namely the writing of Unit Histories, was never fulfilled although in 1966 a Divisional Artillery History was published.

In order to ensure that the money available in the Historic Fund Trust was put to a purpose not dissimilar to that for which it was originally intended a New Zealand Gunner Trust has been formed and the money from the Historic Fund has now been transferred to the new Gunner Trust Fund.

The objects of the Trust, as stated in the Trust Deed are:

To record the history of the Regiment for the benefit of future New Zealanders, including the erection and maintenance of a memorial in the Queen Elizabeth Army Memorial Museum at Waiouru, to comprise a display of militaria to illustrate to the public the history of the Royal Regiment of New Zealand Artillery and to provide the New Zealand Army with an aid to the teaching of the history of that Regiment.

The Trustees of the New Zealand Gunner Trust are:

Maj Gen R D P Hassett CB CBE
The Colonel Commandant for the time being of the Royal Regiment of
New Zealand Artillery

The Commissioner of Inland Revenue has granted charitable status to the Trust so that rebates of income tax are available in the normal manner to all those who contribute. A bank account has been opened in the name of the Trust at the Bank of New Zealand Petone (Account No 05440212327) All contributions should be made to the New Zealand Gunner Trust, and sent to 22 (D) Battery RNZA, Pattie Street, Petone. The Trust will be administered on behalf of the Trustees by 22 (D) Battery who will issue appropriate receipts for tax purposes.

A separate individual approach will be made to the many Gunner Associations scattered throughout New Zealand for contributions to the Trust Fund. Those Associations who are in the process of winding down and holding their "last" reunions may consider the New Zealand Gunner Trust an appropriate repository for any spare funds which they have available.
